John Parham's research interests lie in ecocriticism, Victorian Studies and critical pedagogy. He is the author of two books, with one on the poet Gerard Manley Hopkins, *Green Man Hopkins: Poetry and the Victorian Ecological Imagination* (Rodopi: 2010), and the other an edited collection, *The Environmental Tradition in English Literature* (Ashgate: 2002). He has published articles on pedagogy and on a range of topics from Victorian Studies – e.g. William Morris, John Stuart Mill, Charles Dickens – to 'green' perspectives on British and Australian punk. John is Secretary to the UK & Ireland branch of ASLE (the Association for the Study of Literature and Environment) and editor of its journal *Green Letters*. He is currently undertaking research that addresses green media and popular culture.

John teaches a range of modules at the University of Worcester but, in particular, he is responsible for specialist modules in popular culture, popular fiction, television and radio drama, green media, research methods, and (at MA level) ecocriticism. He is the Admissions Tutor for Media & Cultural Studies and fulfils further roles associated with research at the University.
