Alison and Janet are both senior lecturers within the Department for Children and Families. They have been involved in learning and teaching projects linked to refugee children and their families in Calais. Alison and Janet draw upon their own extensive professional practice in education, family support, early years, international experience and community development.

Adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) are traumatic events that occur during childhood. ACEs can have a significant impact on a person's physical, emotional, and mental health throughout their life. Over the last year, many families have found themselves experiencing adversity and this raises concerns regarding children's long and short-term outcomes. However, research shows that early intervention and proactive support to families can make a real difference.

This course provides an introduction to ACEs using case study material, and introduces practical strategies to support children both at home and within the setting.
