
Philosophy and Nursing: Where are we now? 16 November 2023

<u>Mark Risjord</u> – Philosophic thinking about, in, and for nursing: What forms does this thinking take, and does it help or contribute to practice?



<u>Barbara Pesut</u> – The essential role of logic, and in particular nursing logic, in preventing illogical (and worse tokenistic) approaches to equity and inclusion.





<u>Denise J Drevdahl</u> and <u>Mary K Canales</u> – Nursing's professionalization project: Nursing education has advanced educational requirements (competencies, standards, essentials) as a means to ensure that nursing is seen as a profession. Denise and Mary consider the consequences of pursuing this project for those inside and outside the discipline.





Lousie Racine and Helen Vandenberg – Is anti-intellectualism fostered in nursing education? Louise and Helen explore this question to create awareness about the impact of anti-intellectualism on nursing as a scientific discipline. Exploring the context that cultivates its influence, they suggest anti-intellectualism impoverishes nursing thought.
